District Governor Report

Dear Fellow Lions,

It has been great to be out and about visiting our clubs, doing quite a few inductions of new members and hearing about all of the great things our clubs and members have been up to.

Last week I attended a gathering of Zone Clubs most of who had not received a DG team visit to date because of the Covid restrictions. What is really obvious is not only the vast range of projects taken on right across our District but even across a single zone. It may not be the news you want to hear but it may be the information that determines ultimately whether you Club survives long term in an ever changing world.


I have long held the view that people join a community service organisation to serve

their community not to sit in meetings just talking and not just doing projects that raise funds to give away to some other group, unless that is really what they are happy doing.

Someone I know has the saying that being able to look the person in the eye who has just received a gift of something from you is the most powerful thing. I also have a saying that volunteers vote with their feet; they walk into our clubs because they want to contribute and they walk out because they don't feel valued or appreciated.

I recently visited club which almost folded last year because of lack of replacements for their leadership which had been decimated because of illness and death in their ranks. They felt that with no one to lead them why bother? What a difference a couple of new members with fresh ideas has made. We were also able to induct 2 more new relatively young members on the night. It is all looking up from here.

Next week Claire and I are off to Canberra for Council of Governors meetings in preparation for the Multiple District Convention. DGE Steve will be going up around the same time to complete his training in preparation for the next Lions year, which is fast approaching. Whether we are at the top of the tree in our clubs or district we're not too old or too experienced to listen to new ideas or find out about different ways of doing things. None of us knows it all. The dates are out for the Club Development Days. You will see that there is one near you in 3 different locations, Cranbourne, Trafalgar, and Bairnsdale. There is always something new to learn, even if you have done it all before, there is the opportunity to interact with



others to pass on some of our knowledge and exchange ideas.

On a more personal note, I would like to thank all who expressed their condolences and sympathies on the passing of my brother. Whether it's expected or not, it is never the news you want to hear. We were very close together in age and were virtually inseparable in our younger years. Even though we had a tough upbringing, one of the hardest things I have had to do was firstly to watch him suffer and then speak at his funeral. Hug your families and your friends, tell them you love them. Nothing in life is ever guaranteed.

LIONS GLOBAL CAUSES—CHILDHOOD CANCER



The Australian Lions Cancer Research Foundation and Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF) have committed A\$4 million to fund the whole genome sequencing of 400 children with high risk cancers in Australia over 3 years.

This funding will enable <u>Garvan</u> to work with the Children's Cancer Institute to undertake

- the sequencing, analysis and the creation of a database which can be used by researchers and doctors worldwide. It could help kids everywhere have a better chance of a healthy life.
- It is also your chance to be part of a massive step forward in the ?ght against kids' cancers.

The Lions Kids Cancer Genome Project (Genome Power) is a joint initiative of the **Garvan Institute** of Medical Research, the Lions Clubs International Foundation and the Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Foundation.

Genome Power will be supporting Australia's national personalised medicine program for childhood cancer – the Zero Childhood Cancer Program, led by Children's Cancer Institute and the Kids Cancer Centre, Sydney Children's Hospital, Randwick. In its first three years, Genome Power will provide whole genome sequencing and analysis for 400 children with high-risk cancer in Australia who will be enrolled in the Zero Childhood







President Bob Rayner of the Hampton Park Lions Club presenting the gong and gavel.




The Club chartered with 24 members as a multi cultural club - they have 5 different nationalities.



The Foundation

The Foundation was formed by the Lions Club of Elwood and was a project of District 201V1.

The first trustees in 1980 were Lion lan Collis (Elwood), Past District Governor Neil Armstrong, Lions Henry Bell, David Hatfield, Piloo Rustromjee, and Roger Newton. Elwood had two trustees up until about 2000.

Lion Terry Collison joined the Trustees in the early 90s, was Vice Chairman and took over from Nell as Chairman in the middle 90s until 2000.

Main fundraiting in the beginning was donations from Clubs in District 201V1. From 1994 to 1997, the Foundation was the main beneficiary for the "Gown of the Year" (run by the fashion industry).

The Foundation funded research at the Monash Medical Centre from the beginning and was funding at \$10,000 per year (\$2500 each quarter) from interest earned. Currently donations are about \$5,000 per year.

Rheumatoid Arthritis (RA) is an autoimmune disease, in many ways similar to lupus, that causes pain and swelling of the joints. The normal role of your body's immune system is to fight off infections to keep you healthy. In an autoimmune disease, your immune system starts attacking your own healthy tissues.

In RA, the immune system targets the lining of the joints, causing inflammation and joint damage.

RA usually affects smaller joints, such as the joints in the hands and feet. However larger joints such as the hips and knees can also be affected.

Osteo Arthritis (OA) sometimes called degenerative joint disease or degenerative arthritis.

OA is the most common chronic condition of the joints, affecting approximately up to 5 million Australians.

OA can affect any joint but it occurs most often in the knees, hips lower back and neck, small joints of the fingers and bases of the thumb and big toe.

Peace and Service Go Hand in Hand

I remember walking hand in hand with my Grandfather when I was a little boy. He was a very wise man, his grey hair highlighting his wisdom. His hands felt dry and rough, particularly to a child who uses his fingers to read.

It was many years later when I stood at his funeral that I realized the significance of those dry, rough hands. They were the hands that held mine and guided me when I was young. They were the hands of a young man, who went to War, sacrificing his own safety, to preserve freedom in our country. They were the hands of a man who held his dying mate in battle. They were the hands of a man who mowed the lawns of local elderly people. They were the hands of the man that had been awarded medals, yet didn't wear them as he felt he did not need recognition for his service. They were the hands of a man who truly understood what service meant.

My Grandfather planted a seed in my mind many years ago about the importance of service and its huge contribution to not only peace in our communities but providing inner peace as well. I often think about the conflicts, wars and fighting in the world and the sadness in many people's lives. I also often think about how selfless my Grandfather was by helping others without wanting anything in return. My Grandfather would say to me, "you don't have sight, but you have insight and that is much more important."

We can find inspiration from so many who have gone before us. Mother Theresa who served the poor in India. William Booth, Founder of the Salvation Army, who dedicated his life to helping the poor. The most inspiring for me personally, is Helen Keller who herself was blind and deaf, yet lived a life of service. Despite her disabilities she helped veterans blinded in World War 1, founded charities, advocated for the blind and poor and led the American Foundation for the Blind for over forty years. All these incredible people served others, and by doing so brought peace ta the poor, wounded and hungry. A quote by Albert Schweitzer resonates with me, "the only really happy people are those who have learned how to serve."

I have made a promise to my Grandfather. That I will spread the word about serving others and how it not only promotes peace for others hut also provides an inner peace that so many people are striving for, I can serve others despite my disability. I do not want to be self-focused but focused on others. I hope to inspire others to achieve peace through service. In the words of Mother Theresa, "The fruit of service is peace." I want to plant seeds of peace in my life and encourage others to do so also. Peace and service go hand in hand just like my Grandfather and I walking along many years ago.
